

# Time To Text

Going back to school signifies a time of new beginnings – new teachers and friends, more difficult classes and exciting experiences. It can also be a time of new challenges for many young people, with added pressure from friends when it comes to teen drug and alcohol use.

Our research has confirmed increases in use of drugs that teens are likely to encounter at parties and in other social situations. Surprisingly, teenage girls are more likely than teenage boys to perceive potential benefits from drug use and drinking, making teen girls more vulnerable to drug and alcohol abuse.



As your teens prepare to go back to school, show them how much you care and help them make the grade. Let them know you're there to help them handle new situations and stresses in a healthy way. Talk to your teens in their language. Take Time To Text your teens!

## Why text?

For many teens, text messaging is a primary form of communication. It's a quick, easy and private way for them to make plans, gossip and stay in touch. While nothing takes the place of a face-to-face conversation, **text messaging can help parents open new lines of communication**, and it's a non-confrontational way to start conversations about sensitive topics like stress in school or concern about curfews. **Texting is another way to show your support and stay connected to teens and tweens.**



Texting is an opportunity to talk to your teens on their terms. Surveys show that more than half of teens who text message think it has improved their relationship with their parents, and 51 percent of parents who text with their teens agree that they communicate more often.

## TIPS FOR TEXTING

No clue how 2 txt? UR not alone. Text messaging may feel like a foreign language, but we're here to help you get started.

### The Lingo

Teen text lingo is its own language—one with no punctuation and lots of abbreviations! When you text your teen, it helps to show you know the ropes.

### A parents guide to text talk:

- **Shorten, abbreviate, condense:** Drop vowels and replace words with numbers whenever possible to keep your message short. **Check out our list at the right for some common terms.**
- **Numbers count too:** “I love you” is 143, “information” is 411, “Anyone” is NE1
- **Don’t use all capital letters unless you’re mad—** it means you’re yelling!

<b>143</b> I love you	<b>JK</b> just kidding
<b>411</b> information	<b>L8R</b> later
<b>BCUZ</b> because	<b>LOL</b> laugh out loud
<b>BTW</b> by the way	<b>NE1</b> anyone
<b>CU L8R</b> see you later	<b>NP</b> no problem
<b>F2T</b> free to talk	<b>OMG</b> oh my god
<b>H&amp;K</b> hugs & kisses	<b>Thx</b> thanks
<b>GUDLUK</b> good luck	<b>TTYL</b> talk to you later
<b>IDK</b> I don’t know	<b>UR</b> you’re



## HOW TO SEND A TEXT MESSAGE

(this may vary slightly from phone to phone)

1. Select Menu on your phone, and choose an option called “**Messages**” or “**Send Message**”
2. Depending on your phone, you will be prompted to type the message first or enter the recipient’s phone number. **You may be able to choose your teen’s number from your phone book.**
3. **There are two ways to type:**

The first utilizes a program on your phone called **t9**. Just push the button with the letter you want ONCE. Once you have entered several letters, the phone will display common words that can be made with the letters you entered. Just select the word you want. Repeat until message is done.

The second method is easier but takes longer. Each number on the phone represents three letters. Push the number on your phone however many times it takes to get to that letter. (2=a 22=b 555=l) If you need to type a letter that is on the same key as your previous letter wait a few seconds and then type the letter.

4. **Hit Send!**
