On July 17th, I began my first day as the interim superintendent in the Mosinee School District. Thank you to the Mosinee School District community for being so welcoming to me as I transition to this new position. I feel very fortunate to work with the school board, administrators, teachers and staff who are committed to providing joyful, rich learning experiences for all of our students.

This will be my 32nd year as an educator. In 1992, I began my career in education teaching science at Little Wolf High Interim Superintendent of Schools School and Middle School in Manawa, WI. In 1994, I continued

my teaching career as a science teacher at Minocqua Joint District #1 in Minocqua WI, and in 2006, became the principal. In 2014, I was selected to be the director of curriculum, instruction and assessment at Lakeland Union High School in Minocqua where I also was appointed interim superintendent and superintendent. Over the past 31 years I have learned that the key to unlocking the incredible potential of all learners is to cultivate curiosity. We are very fortunate to have a highly educated, experienced and dedicated staff to provide excellence for all our students.

It is my belief that trust matters. The philosopher Annette Baier (1994) observed that we tend to notice trust as we notice air, only when it becomes scarce or polluted. These days, trust in our society does seem to have been damaged and is in scarce supply. Open communication that is both accurate and forthcoming builds trust. Building bridges with families is a key link in our work. Honesty and integrity are paramount to building trust.

It is a privilege to serve as the interim superintendent of the Mosinee School District. I am looking forward to providing strong leadership, stability and vision as we continue to move the district forward.

Mosinee Baseball Honors Former Coach with Memorial Scoreboard

Bus Safety Reminders

Bus safety is everyone's responsibility - students, parents and community members all play a role.


- When the yellow bus lights are activated, SLOW **DOWN**; the bus will be making a stop within 100-300 feet. Drivers must stop on the street or highway 20 feet or more from any school bus that has stopped. Remember, students board/unload on both sides of the street. PLEASE, help keep our students safe.
- Students should be at their designated bus stop two minutes prior to the time they load the bus; this allows routes to stay on time and makes other traffic aware of upcoming stops.
- Do not let students wear earbuds while boarding the bus; they may not hear the bus horn if there is danger while boarding.
- Students need to watch the driver's signals while boarding and exiting the bus. Students should move to and from their driveway quickly.
- Students must remain in their seats; it can be difficult to maintain balance if the bus must stop suddenly.
- All snacks should remain in the student's backpack; this helps stop any potential choking hazards.
- Parents should note any bus changes in the student's planner; teachers and bus drivers can use this as a reference if there are any questions in the afternoon.

- Bus riding is a privilege and can be revoked if the rules are not followed. Bus riding rules are listed in student planners under "Transportation."

He went to a Brewers game which was a lot of fun; baseball is not popular in the Czech Republic. Cheese curds and the homemade pancakes made by his host mom, Heather, are his favorite American foods.



From Bad Krozingen, Germany, Lena Kerviel has a French father and German mother, so she speaks fluent French and German. She plays soccer, the tuba, and acts in plays. She is part of the MHS swim team and wants to play basketball and soccer as well. She really misses the one classroom aspect of home because they have the same classmates from 5th through 10th grade. A future English teacher, Vivien Bartelt is here from Berlin, Germany. She loves her host brother and sister, Kaden and Kaeli Doll. She finds school at MHS to be very different. In Germany they do not have lockers, so students bring their backpacks to class. Also class is 90 minutes. Here students have a choice of what classes to take, but in Germany Vivien has no choice. She said American food is very fattening and

amazing leadership strategies while volunteering their time.



ANNUAL ASBESTOS NOTICE AND INDOOR ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY MANAGEMENT PLAN ASBESTOS NOTICE certified management planner. Periodic surveillances are conduc

This notice is to inform the staff and students of the Mosinee School District that the Federal Environmental Protection Agency has amended the 1982 Asbestos Rule.

The 1982 rule required school districts to conduct an inspection of school buildings for all friable (easily crumbled with hand pressure) asbestos-containing materials and, if present, notify employees and parents of their existence. This rule placed no continuing responsibilities on the districts.

In 1987 the rule changed. Districts are now required to have their school buildings inspected by an accredited inspector for all friable and non-friable asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM), conduct reinspections, and develop a management plan for dealing with asbestos.

In 1988, the Mosinee School District contracted Twin City Testing Corporation of Wausau, Wisconsin, to inspect and develop a Management Plan for each building in the district. The Management Plan was submitted to the Wisconsin Department of Health and Social Services on October 12, 1988, as required by the new law.

The Management Plan had a mandatory implementation date of July 9, 1989. After that date, all asbestos-related work had to be conducted according to the Management Plan, unless altered by a

certified management planner. Periodic surveillances are conducted every six months to document the condition of asbestos-containing building materials.

All asbestos-containing building materials will be maintained with an operations and maintenance program, unless conditions warrant other action. Anyone interested in additional information about the location of asbestos containing building materials may contact the principal of the respective building or the district office to view a copy of the Management Plan for all district buildings.

INDOOR ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY MANAGEMENT PLAN

This notice is to inform staff and students of the Mosinee School District that, as directed by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, (2009 - Wisconsin Act 96) has adopted these standards.

The Mosinee School District will continue to give annual written notice to all parent and employee organizations about the availability of the Management Plan and any scheduled abatement activities.
